## Hemblington Primary School: Pupil Premium Report 2019/2020

Pupil Premium (PP) funding is an additional sum allocated to schools by the government in addition to the main school budget. It is awarded on the basis of the number of children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) either currently or at any time in the past 6 years. The funding is seen as a way to address the learning of children identified as vulnerable to underachieving, to support initiatives to ensure that these pupils fulfill their full potential. Looked After children also receive a premium. From 2012, Service children (those who have or had a parent from an Armed Forces background in the past 3 years) receive a smaller premium.

Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium money as they see fit. However, we are held accountable for how we have used the funding and the impact this has had on the achievement and progress of identified pupils.

We continue to use the money from our main budget to support vulnerable children with barriers to learning. Glven the success of targeted intervention and support programmes across the school, we have committed to continuing the current types of provision. There has been a particular focus on promoting self esteem, growth mindset, resilience and confidence through support from the Benjamin Foundation and other wellbeing interventions.

We have also continued to invest in NFER assessment resources to enable closer tracking and thus speedier interventions for those pupils who might not be making as rapid progress as expected.

We continue to monitor and address the barriers to learning which affect our PP pupils. These can significantly change from year to year.
